COMBINED DEGREE PROGRAMS

For students interested in medicine (REMS), engineering (GEAR), education (GRADE), or public health (HEAL), the College offers selective programs for exceptional undergraduates that guarantee admission to professional or graduate school upon completion of the bachelor's degree. Students interested in music (DDE) may gain admission to both the College and Eastman School of Music to pursue a BS/BA plus BM. Students interested in nursing (DDN) may gain admission to both the College and School of Nursing to pursue a BS/BA plus BSN. Testing Policy

Admission to the College of Arts, Sciences and Engineering is based on a holistic review process that includes a test-optional philosophy. This review process incorporates a variety of factors, including many kinds of academic and non-academic factors and realizes that standardized tests may not be an accurate reflection of a student's abilities. Through our test-optional approach, applicants may decide for themselves which exam, if any, is an accurate representation of their ability and potential for future success. The University will continue to review and consider test scores for those applicants who decide to submit them. Applicants choosing to not submit standardized tests will not be at a disadvantage nor will it negatively impact their application review.

Veterans and Military Families

The University of Rochester has been a participant in the Yellow Ribbon Program since 2009. Veterans, spouses, and

dependents with 100% entitlement for Post-9/11 G.I. Bill® will have tuition and mandatory fees paid through a combination of VA funding, Yellow Ribbon, and Rochester Pledge. At this time, the University is not limiting their number of Yellow Ribbon participants. All admitted students who are eligible will automatically qualify.

FINANCIAL AID

We are committed to meeting the full demonstrated need of all students who earn admission to the College. Financial need can be a contributing factor in our admissions decisions about most international applicants and a small percentage of our US applicants.
